He was a lifelong member of the Nutmeg Beagle Club and Turner Hall Society.

Mr. Tapley is survived by his sons, Jonathan Tapley and David Tapley and wife, Eunsil; daughters, Marcia Devine and her husband, Steven and Lisa Bellinger and her husband, Arthur (Tony); stepsons, Dean Karrass and his wife, Sharon and John Henry Pearcy and his wife, Hyo-Suk; three grandsons; two step-grandsons; and two step-granddaughters.
